Instructions for use:

Most tasks have been differentiated to three levels with the orange boxed task being the easier of the three and the grey being the more challenging.

For mixed ability classes we suggest keeping all tasks and directing your students towards their appropriate level. For setted classes you can delete the tasks you feel are not appropriate.

Throughout we have added questions in orange that can be used to prompt conversation, draw further information from your students and deepen their understanding.

Gay Lesbian Bisexual Straight

STARTER



'Gay' can be used to describe a man who loves, or wants to be in a loving, romantic relationship with another man.

'Lesbian' can be used to describe a woman who loves, or wants to be in a loving, romantic relationship with another woman.

ASK: Have you heard the word 'gay' used in any other ways?
Was it always positive?





STARTER





'Bisexual' describes a person who is attracted to both men and women.

'Straight' can be used to describe a man who loves, or wants to be in a loving, romantic relationship with a woman, or a woman who wants the same with a man.

PAIR/SHARE



Some people treat lesbian, gay and bisexual people differently to straight people. In many countries lesbian, gay and bisexual people do not have equality.

Why do you think some people treat lesbian, gay and bisexual people badly?

DEEPEN YOUR UNDERSTANDING RANBOW FLAG

Some people may be homophobic (mean to lesbian, gay and bisexual people) because they have been taught to be, believe it goes against their religion, or just because they are not lesbian, gay or bisexual themselves. There are many reasons people are homophobic.

Being lesbian, gay or bisexual is not a choice, it is just a part of who someone is. Is it right to treat a person badly for something they cannot change?



ASK: Do you know a lesbian, gay or bisexual person? How do you treat them?

Skin colour is a part of who someone is.







Religion can be a part of who someone is.







Having a disability can be part of who someone is.

Tell your shoulder partner one thing about their poem you enjoyed or thought they did well.








Share your poem with your face partner


Tell your face partner one thing about their poem you enjoyed or thought they did well
