Dear Parents,

Like giants refreshed, we are tackling this new half term. Today marks a period of frenzied activity for the whole College with an own clothes day in support of the PTA. These days, when combined with heavy rain or snow fall, seem to cause excitement which can best be described as irrational and excessive by teachers and invigorating by pupils. But this is perhaps the best way to prepare for the big upcoming events. Tonight 1600 ticketholders will descend on campus for a firework display in honour of the discovery of the Gunpowder plot. The next morning, our CCF will be providing the colour guard for the remembrance service in the original Liverpool College building as the Collegiate Old Boys Association gathers at the plaque dedicated to those who lost their lives. This is now located in a building housing luxury apartment. On Sunday, the remembrance continues as we will host, for the first time in several years, a complete remembrance service with parade and chapel service.

The post covid development of our CCF continues. It has been great to see the way many Chapter 10 pupils are enthusiastically engaging in all the leadership and outdoor education provided through this unique part of our school. We are one of the largest CCF contingents, and among the founders of this movement back in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

The history of the school was on our minds when our College leaders were briefed on the work done by the Liverpool College Foundation to establish a top-quality archive of Liverpool College and Huyton College. Remembrance weekend is also a time when we mention the heroic figures in the history of the school. Almost all pupils know about Noel Chavasse VC & Bar, MC, a doctor who heroically saved lives in the First World War, hated conflict and never fired a shot in anger. He competed in the Olympics, took a science degree, and especially loved his work with a youth group. He was a tireless advocate of the welfare of troops. It is sobering to reflect that his brother Aidan who also perished in the war and whose body was never recovered is barely remembered. A surviving brother donated a cross in his memory. In this time of conflict in so many places

across the world, the prayer for peace, the hope for peace wells up naturally on Remembrance Sunday.

Our musicians have been busy over the half term, engaging in workshops, rehearsals and performances at various venues across the UK and Europe.



Will M, Adam S & Solomon W (Ch12, pictured) performed a set of ABBA songs at a 17<sup>th</sup> Birthday party at a venue in Allerton, supported by Joe N (Ch10) in the technical department; James K (Ch 8) and Grace K (Ch11) took part in the National Youth Orchestra Unite Inspire course in Lancaster; Leo B (Ch11) and Maria B (Ch7) took part in Orchestral ensembles at Dunfield House, Herefordshire, performing as soloists in works by Brahms, Bruch, Bloch, Dvořák and Bach; Adam S (Ch10), Enzo S (Ch10)

Mrs Drew (Careers Leader) reports on our on-going programme for pupils and students:



*On Thursday, Ch12 and 13 students who are interested in a law career were invited to meet with Jack Lewis, a trainee solicitor, from Macfarlanes, a law firm based in London. Jack gave our students an insight into his route into the profession, the structure of Macfarlanes and some of their international client base and then Jack gave our students information on Macfarlanes Legal Academy. This academy gives students an opportunity to spend a week on work experience in the main office in London, all expenses paid. Students are then mentored and return to the office for a follow up a year later. A really engaging session and fantastic opportunity.*

We have finally received confirmation of the start date of the construction of the new building on the senior school campus. This will commence November 27. We will be keeping you posted on developments as any construction of this scale and scope will, sad to say, lead to changes and disruptions and will require some co-operation on your part. As the project progresses, we look forward to the eventual opening of Queens Drive (no date has yet been provided to us for this), the erection of parking barriers on Queens Drive and the eventual creation of a Toucan crossing across North Mossley Hill Road and an illuminated walking path down Ibbotson's Lane. Please do help us keep children safe, especially now that school is taking place in semi-nocturnal conditions. There is far too much reckless and dangerous driving and we need to work together to prioritize the safety of persons over the convenience of ourselves.

The presence of invigilators on campus reminds us of the constant reality of examinations. The DfE has now published data about the performance of Liverpool College pupils last year. There are so many things to celebrate. Our pupils and students performed well in every phase. For me the highlights were the amazing KS2 SATs results. One example is that our pupils were in the 99<sup>th</sup> percentile nationwide for their in-depth mastery in Mathematics. Another very pleasing light point in the sea of positive data, is the performance of pupils who are disadvantaged in some way. They made even better progress than their counterparts at the end of Chapter 11. 85% of our pupils passed English and Maths, for boys in Liverpool overall that figure drops below 50%. At A and GCSE level, we had the second highest achievement in the city, behind a school that selects its pupils solely on academic ability rather than our non-academically selective process. There is much to celebrate but we move forward with determination to address all areas of school life, focusing especially on the development of the character of our pupils, their participation and contribution to the community, their integrity in living our values, and their care for each other.

May I wish you and yours a pleasant and dry weekend and a Happy Diwali to all our families who will be celebrating on Sunday.
