The Sixth Form at Liverpool College is a happy and caring environment and one in which new and returning students work together with teachers to ensure the personal and intellectual development of every student.

## A curriculum to challenge and develop the whole person

Sixth Form at Liverpool College develops and stretches the whole person with all students following a programme combining any of these options:

- Four A-levels and EPQ
- Three A-Levels and EPQ
- One BTEC, two A-Levels and EPQ
- Two BTECs, one A-Level and EPQ
- Three BTECs and EPQ

Students with a GCSE grade point average of above 8 are encouraged to start the study of four A-Levels plus EPQ. Most will then drop one of these subjects at some point in year 12.



## Choosing your subjects

You will need to consult many people as you make your decisions about the future. You should take opportunities to talk to individual teachers and Heads of Faculty to discuss the courses in more detail. Your parents will also want to do their research so that they can discuss the options with you and help you make the right choice. Our Assistant Head of Sixth Form / UCAS coordinator and our Careers Officer are available to provide specialist information and advice, especially on subject combinations for certain degrees and careers. We will also hold taster sessions for many areas of the curriculum.

To help you choose, we would advise that you consider the following points:

- Enjoyment of the subject and your aptitude for it are your first considerations.
- You will be studying the subject for 9 hours per fortnight in class and the same amount of work outside of lessons is expected.
- Sixth Form provides an opportunity to specialise, but that does not mean that it is necessarily good for you to do so. Sciences can easily be mixed with Humanities, the Arts and Languages.
- Very few degree courses specify certain subjects at A-Level. You will need Chemistry and at least one other science for Medicine; you will need Maths and/or Physics for Engineering.
- For most degree courses, however, there is considerable flexibility. Check typical course requirements in discussion with teachers or through the UCAS website [www.ucas.com](http://www.ucas.com)

### **16-19 Bursary**

The 16-19 Bursary is designed to help support those people who face the greatest barriers to continuing in education and training post-16.

A bursary is money that you and your school can use to pay for things like:

- clothing, books and other equipment for your course
- transport and lunch on days you study or train

## Extended Project Qualification

The EPQ at Liverpool College is the epitome of our motto, “Non solum ingenii verum etiam virtutis” taken from Cicero "Not only the intellect but also the character."

- The EPQ allows students to explore their academic interest further, whilst at the same time developing character traits and transferable skills that are useful in every aspect of future life. It is a core part of our Sixth Form experience and one that all students complete.
- We encourage students to explore any topic they're interested in, which may or may not match up with their A-Level choices or future plans.
- Whatever area of study you really love – whether it's Engineering, Languages, Sport or Art-based, an Extended Project Qualification gives you the opportunity to develop your skills and knowledge AND impress Universities at the same time.
- It allows you to explore a topic you are genuinely interested in - either beyond the scope of your A-Levels, or something else entirely.
- It can demonstrate to Universities that you're enthusiastic about the subject you're applying to study especially Medicine and Engineering.
- Universities value the EPQ, and many make lower offers based upon completion of it.
- The EPQ is worth half an A-Level in terms of UCAS points - more than an AS qualification.
- It gives you transferable skills - researching, time management, evidence selection, - which are highly valued by Universities and employers.





## Key dates 2022-2023

**10<sup>th</sup> November** - The application process for prospective Liverpool College students will begin via an application link on the school website.

**15<sup>th</sup> November** – Year 11 students at Liverpool College will be emailed a link to an online application form.

**1<sup>st</sup> March** - Deadline for applications from external applicants.

**June** (post GCSE Exams) - Sixth Form Taster Days

**24<sup>th</sup> August** - Confirmation of place and subject options takes place on GCSE Results Day.

## Application Process

In the initial stage we would like you to indicate on your application (in order of preference) four subjects that you would like to study. Students often study 3 subjects and this will be narrowed down at a later stage.

## General Entry Requirements

Please note that the general entry requirements listed are the same for both internal and external applicants.

For all students:

- 1 - A minimum of grade 4 in Mathematics
- 2 - A minimum of grade 4 in English Language
- 3 - You must have at least 5 subjects at grade 5 or higher, including at least one in English\* or maths

\* English Language or English Literature

## Subjects

The table shows the subjects which we plan to offer in September 2023.

The grade listed is the minimum needed to ensure that students can meet the demands of the course.

<b>ART</b>	Grade 6 in GCSE Art. You may study art at A-Level without a GCSE provided that you can demonstrate an aptitude for the subject by producing a folio of work.
<b>BIOLOGY</b>	Grade 7 in GCSE Biology or 7 6 in Science Trilogy.
<b>BUSINESS STUDIES</b> A-level	Grades 6-5 in any combination from Mathematics and an English GCSE. Grade 6 in GCSE Business Studies (External candidates only.)
<b>BUSINESS BTEC</b>	You need to meet the minimum requirements for entry to Sixth Form.
<b>CHEMISTRY</b>	Grade 7 in GCSE Chemistry or 7 7 in Science Trilogy.
<b>CLASSICS</b>	Grade 5 GCSE Classics and a 5 in an English GCSE. You may study Classics A-level without a GCSE in the subject provided that you have a grade 6 in an English GCSE.
<b>COMPUTER SCIENCE</b>	Grade 6 in Computer Science GCSE and Grade 6 in Mathematics.
<b>COMPUTING BTEC</b>	You need to meet the minimum requirements for entry to Sixth Form.
<b>DESIGN TECHNOLOGY</b>	Grade 6 from GCSE DT or equivalent design course.
<b>ECONOMICS</b>	A grade 7-6 combination in either order from Mathematics and an English GCSE.
<b>ENGLISH LANGUAGE</b>	Grade 6 in GCSE English Language.

## Subjects

<b>ENGLISH LITERATURE</b>	Grade 6 in GCSE English Literature.
<b>FURTHER MATHS</b>	Grade 7 in GCSE Maths. NB - Further Maths can only be taken as a fourth subject.
<b>GEOGRAPHY</b>	Grade 6 in GCSE Geography and Grade 5 in an English GCSE.
<b>HISTORY</b>	Grade 6 in GCSE History and Grade 5 in an English GCSE.
<b>MATHS</b>	Grade 7 in GCSE Maths.
<b>MEDIA</b>	Grade 5 in English Language GCSE.
<b>MUSIC</b>	Grade 6 or above in GCSE Music.
<b>PHYSICS</b>	7 in Single Science Physics or 77 in Science Trilogy. In addition, a 7 in Maths is needed.
<b>POLITICS</b>	Grade 6 in GCSE History, Geography or English Literature.
<b>SPANISH</b>	Grade 6 in GCSE Spanish
<b>SPORT BTEC</b>	You need to meet the minimum requirements for entry to Sixth Form.

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
