Nikita A, one of our Prefect Boarding students has written this account:



The Old Lerpoolians hosted the Senior Golfers for a day of competition. The Old Boys won but the boys did play with a keen standard that didn't embarrass. They then enjoyed the hospitality of the OLs' who undoubtedly advised them on how to improve upon their game.

On Thursday George S, Dylan L, Sean C and I competed in the annual Old Lerpoolian Golf Society tournament at Childwall Golf Club. It was a classic battle in which youth would meet experience.

The day commenced at lunch time which presented a great opportunity to mingle with our predecessors from the College and a chance to reflect on how the College has grown and developed over time. Shortly after, it was tee-off time and our game faces were on.

We were all placed in separate teams of 4 (I current student and 3 Old Lerpoolians) in which the current student would go head-to-head with one of the other Old Lerpoolians. The scoring system was based on the Stableford system, in which a player scores 3 points for birdie (I under par), 2 points for par, I point for bogey (I over par) and so on. At the end of the round, the point collation from the current students would be put against the Old Lerpoolians for the chance to win a trophy. The boys all agreed that the first hole is usually the worst, so with that swiftly behind us, we progressed through the course and our golfing skill began to improve. The weather conditions were not kind to us as the rain began to pour through the middle holes, providing some make-shift peat bogs in the rough; these were not easy to negotiate our way out of but we made it work. The weather subsided and we all finished the back nine strong and satisfied with our performance.

Despite our best efforts, our team came up short on the points tally and we were well and truly beaten by our elders which provided us with some food for thought ie *you can't* supplement experience. We all played some good golf but George, the most experienced in our team, scored an impressive 22 points to prove that he is a highly skilled young golfer.

I would strongly encourage students and parents reading this Newsletter to try playing golf if you haven't before, because it is a great sport that develops discipline and commitment but also is a gripping hobby. I only started in the summer but I was quickly addicted and I am committed to keep improving.

Liverpool College VS Cheadle Hulme

On the 12th October Liverpool College headed up to Manchester, where they would play a tough game against an inform Cheadle Hulme side.

The early 7:20 meet certainly had an impact, as the lads were very tired during the first 20 minutes of the game. This was shown through Cheadle dominating most of the possession, within the College's half. Nevertheless, some very well organised defence meant Cheadle were unable to get a try. However, an eventual missed tackle allowed them to score the first try of the game, making the score 7-0.

After conceding a try, the boys began to form an attack of their own, spending the remainder of the first half in the Cheadle 22m. Unfortunately, after many attempts, the boys were unable to get a try of their own, and a fortunate kick and chase from the opposition, meant Cheadle scored their second of the game.

The second half began with the College being on the front foot attacking well against the Cheadle defence. However, an unlucky turnover meant they were forced to start defending. Once again, a nice kick into the corner from the opposing fly half meant the defending was now being done in the College's 5 metre. The defending finally fell through and a missed tackle meant the opposition had scored once again. The try furthered Cheadle's momentum as they continued to attack in the Liverpool College half, before scoring their 4th try of the game.

Following the try, the lads understood that they had to finish the game strong. They began to attack with many phases of bulldozing crash balls. Finally, the attack became too much for the opposition, and Michael C scored a try, making the game finish at 28-7. The defeat was disappointing, and the lads understood this. Nevertheless, the defending throughout the game was impressive, and the eventual try showed the passion within the boys.

In the afternoon we shall visit the Baths of Caracalla, the largest set of baths in Rome. 18.30-20.00 After a quick change at the hotel, we will have our evening meal at Ristorante Gusto, inside Termini Station. 21.00-22.00 We will be taken by coach to Bowling Roma for an evening of bowling.
unday 20 th October	8.30-16.30 We shall spend the day travelling to and exploring Ostia Antica, the ancient port of Rome. It is site similar to Pompeii in that there is lots of see and it is in remarkable condition. 19.00 onwards After changing back at the hotel, we shall have our evening meal at Hard Rock Café, and then students will be allowed some free time for shopping and exploring within a clearly defined area
1onday 21≝ October	10.00-11.30 Visit to Museum of the Ara Pacis, a fantastic monument erected by emperor Augustus. 13.00-17.00 Guided tour of St Peter's Basilica and the Vatican Museums, including the Sistine Chapel. Religious Sites: A mandatory dress code must be respected and maintained during the entire visit. Shoulders to knees should be covered: Sleeveless blouses, miniskirts, shorts and hats are not allowed. 19.30-21.30 Final evening meal at Pasta and Social International. This is near the Colosseum, so we should be able to have an evening walk and some free time round this area, with the opportunities for photographs of the Colosseum at night.

Approximate pick-up time at Manchester Airport for transfer to Liverpool College. 16.00-16.30 Estimated arrival time at Liverpool College. Pick up on North Mossley Hill Road.
