In total, twenty eight volunteers confirmed attendance, including HR experts, financial managers, solicitors, university lecturer, doctor, corporate affairs manager, property manager, architect, headteacher, IT executive and NHS professional.

Mock interviews are essential to boost the confidence of pupils, to learn how to best sell their abilities and skills and to teach pupils how to remain calm and composed under stress. The pupils found the interviews extremely beneficial and the feedback after the event reflected how valuable they had considered the experience to be.

I was struck by a letter from Geoff Barton the general secretary of the ASCL, a union of school leaders. Mr Barton writes about the national pandemic of poor behaviour in schools, from pupils, from parents – you can <u>click here</u> to read the post.

It is an interesting and sobering read. Sobering because he seems somewhat surprised by the responses he is getting from headteachers across the country. Sobering because he does not know why these trends are rocking schools across the country. His suggestion that we find out why is a good one. But I am going to spare you having to wait for the outcome of research which may never be done and which will likely fail to capture the complexity of factors which are causing some children suffering especially in their mental health. In our experience, there is almost always a connection between social media use, on-line behaviours and serious misbehaviour or struggles in school. There is no longer any doubt. Children especially vulnerable children, do not cope with the mockery, anonymous bullying, and endless marketing and brand promotions which frequently makes up their experience

of time spent online.

Let me give you a very real example.



This ridiculously hyped and marketed drink is the product of two youtubers. These men are so called influencers and they have persuaded the youth of this country to part with 5 to 10 pounds for a bottle of sugar water. We are amazed to discover seemingly calm pupils excited about obtaining this stuff, selling it to friends, etc etc. One could argue that there will always be products which entice and seduce the young into parting with money, indeed the craze for vaping falls into this category also. What interest me is the way some of our pupils can no longer distinguish between the real and the fictive, the marketed and the earnest. Their exposure to these endless manipulations makes them live life at a heightened state of social insecurity and moral confusion.

All of us who work here at the College are working to encourage the skills and desire to live in reality, to embrace real things, real relationships, real life. It is clearly necessary to be more explicit in what we mean by not only the intellect but also the character, and more will be forthcoming. Watch this space. I would also encourage every parent to discover how long their child is spending online and talk to them about what they are seeing and experiencing online.
