Dear Parents,

There is mixture of thoughts when I see our pupils enjoy a dress down day. It is wonderful that they get relief from the heat, although many seem to be wearing more clothes than the uniform they complain of when the temperature gets above 20°C. But there is also the gratitude for uniform, its simplicity, its fundamental role in marking out the seriousness of school and our collective purposes.
