Dear Parents,

This week has been an occasion to marvel once again at the infinite energy and variety of educational initiatives which take place in a seven-day period within our school.

Mrs Doran herself accounts for so many of these innovative things.

Here is a sample:

All Chapter 5 pupils had a superb day on Monday when they learnt about the Ancient Greeks through videography. Watching a series of carefully selected video clips, the pupils were able to explore multiple aspects of the Ancient Greeks, focusing upon Homer's Odyssey. The pupils used the clips to stimulate some wonderful writing, then created a fabulous video to retell the story, with every pupil taking an important role. The final film will hopefully be ready to view by the pupils next week.

Mrs Doran also organised a performance of the play *Macbeth*, and I mean the full production, apparently causing a silent attention which was a marvel to behold. <u>Click here</u> to read more.

The phrase pre-covid levels, as in "our economy will not return to pre-covid levels until 2027", is also useful in educational terms. The Book Fair in the Prep School has reached these pre-covid levels. More than £800 has been raised so far. Reading is being emphasized everywhere across the College. In the Prep School we will hold the "pre-covid" bedtime reading night again on Wednesday November 23. On rainy days, senior school pupils reach for their reading books. There can be few sights more beautiful than a class of Chapter 2 pupils all quietly reading their books in class or a Reception pupil eagerly turning the pages of a new book. The interiority of the reading experience is itself a kind of self-discipline which makes all learning flow, and grow. Research shows that pupils who watch their parents read, read more themselves. Do you discuss reading with your child?

Our visitors from the Netherlands were here earlier in the week. Mr Cartwright and Mr Jones provided them with an amazing programme of cultural exploration and joint design work. They were set a challenge, teamed up together internationally. My compatriots' mastery of the English language puts British monolingual bias to shame. These kids were correcting my

English! They all had a wonderful time and in May we shall be travelling to the Netherlands for a return visit to the Melanchthon School.

In the near future, we are beginning a process of occasionally surveying our pupils, staff and parents. Various topics will be presented, and your opinion requested. The new app may be the best way to deliver these surveys to you, we can then inform you of what we have done in response to your suggestions. At our next parent information evening* on Thursday 1 December we want to discuss the way we can communicate better with you as well as give you insight into our behaviour curriculum across the College. Much work is undertaken to improve pupil behaviour which in 95% of cases is absolutely flawless. It is encouraging to read the endless lists of pupils who have never had a detention, or any kind of sanction, and who approach their participation in our community as an opportunity to contribute positively. Similarly, there are a number of success stories we are learning from. Pupils whose behaviour has improved dramatically, who have in a sense turned the corner toward maturity. Our behaviour curriculum seeks to ensure that all pupils attain to a level of self-regulation and self-discipline which enables them to succeed at school and in their lives. We will be discussing how you can support this curriculum as a parent.

The proliferation of pupil inspired and requested groups at Liverpool College continues. This is over and above the curriculum, the teams, fixtures, and personal development programme that every pupil engages in.
