We will be discussing campus expansion, traffic, and the behaviour curriculum of the College. This last item may sound strange to some as we typically speak of behaviour policy, which is something which all schools have. But there is also a sense that behaviour is learned, with some pupils able to regulate their own behaviour and improve it constantly through greater awareness of the needs of others, and an ability to respond appropriately to social situations. Other pupils, a bit like any other aspect of school, need intervention, support, a challenging curriculum that is taught in this case not through endless theorizing but through the example of adults and peers. We want to involve parents in an understanding of how the College approaches this essential part of the education with and for character, our plans to develop this further, and our assessment of how parents can help their pupil.

One of the great delights of being an educator is watching young people start things themselves. Last week I mentioned some of the groups and clubs that make up the "civil" society of Liverpool College. This week I met with the Chapter 12 pupils who have started and developed an ambitious agenda for the medical society including speakers and labbased activities. They even presented an excellent funding proposal for support. Impressive.

Our congratulations to the excellent Lt Cdr Rigby, head of the navy section of our CCF, and to Bella Low, formerly of this parish now studying to be a paramedic at Edge Hill, both were finally able to attend the presentation of their prestigious Lord Lieutenant's awards for service.



A sign of the growing quality and quantity of our musical life was Thursday's Recital in the Rushworth Music Centre. In my memory, I occasionally attended these events when there were perhaps 5 performers who met the standard to enter the recital. Now there were more than 12, playing different genres, instruments, and exhibiting the deep talent that is available to us and the increased up take of music as an academic subject at GCSE and A level. A very exciting and important trend.

I bumped into the rehearsals for *Grease* on the same evening. In the pitch dark of a winter evening, pupils were being put through the paces of choreography. Putting on a musical is a feat of so many parts, one forgets that everyone has to learn the dances as well as the lines, the songs and the music.

The international nature of our school was brought home to me when one pupil complained that his team Iran, had lost heavily.
