NB:

Ring-fenced fund to respond to PP individual needs, particularly in access to cultural activities, IT infrastructure and other barriers to learning.

Monies from this ring fenced amount will not be automatically paid to all individuals as it is based on need only. Requests must fall within the below criteria:

- Educational trips within school time (these will be subject to a contribution depending upon circumstances).
- Essential equipment needed for educating the pupil within college (will be paid in full); this includes equipment for in school hours activity sessions, Games and other educational ventures within school time. Receipts and proof must be presented that purchases are best value for money. Payments will be at the College's discretion, costs for which re-imbursement is expected, should not be incurred without prior approval of the expenditure.
- Uniform. Applications will be considered on a needs basis, payments will be, in the form of vouchers for the school shop, once these vouchers have been spent, no more money will be available.
- Payment for After school activities will be viewed on an individual basis and will only be paid for if the activity is deemed as having impact on the progress of the student (personal one to one care cannot be funded from PP).
- Summer school activities will not be paid for.
