





Headteacher's Award

In assembly this morning, we discussed Mental Health Week 2021. Some of the more common types of mental health problems are anxiety, depression, anger and eating disorders. If your mental health is suffering, you should not keep it inside; talking to people is really helpful, even though it can be very difficult to begin with. Our friends and families can help us, as can our teachers, and even professional counsellors, who are trained to help with these types of problems and are excellent. This year's theme for Mental Health week is nature, and we spoke in the assembly about the importance of it to having good mental health. Nature can help us relax, can boost our mood, can reduce our stress/anxiety and increase our confidence. We have seen this for ourselves in forest school: children improving their self-esteem, making new connections and working together well. Spending a bit of time in nature has been scientifically shown to benefit our mental health, and here are some things you could try:

- A walk in the woods
- Lying on the grass, breathing deeply
- Windy walk by the sea
- Using our senses in nature
- Building a den
- Scavenger hunt

Nature is also a good place to practise mindfulness - stopping, switching off from the business of life and really connecting with the living world around you. Next time you are out in the woods, or at the beach, pause, breathe deeply and take in your surroundings - it really works! We have a lot of posers in Y5R!! They love having their picture taken, but they're such a good-looking bunch, it's hard to resist.


Some of the girls worked together to make a rope swing. Watching them work it out and then testing its strength and usability was fantastic, it actually works!!

John found some new fungus this week, I've never seen it before but it was quite hard. We identified it via the Seek app as King Alfred's Cakes.


