Dear Parents,

This has been a week of variety and energy at Liverpool College.

This morning, the awards assembly in the Prep School gave a marvellous oversight of the things that can happen in 4 days of school. Alongside a large number of schools both in Liverpool and in the rest of England, we are participating in a large survey about pupil wellbeing and mental health run by Oxford University.

This will be the second year that we have participated in the OxWell Survey and we have found the results and data produced to be crucial in planning how we build our College systems to support the wellbeing of our pupils.

Maths challenges of the week:

- Q1. A point source of light is placed at (0, 0, 2). An opaque hollow cylinder without its bases has radius 1 and height 2. It is placed around the light source such that the source is at the centre of the cylinder, and with its axis of circular symmetry parallel to the y-axis. An infinitely large sheet of paper is placed on the xy-plane. Can you find a single equation relating x and y, that describes the curve formed by the light-dark boundary on the sheet of paper, assuming no diffraction?
- Q2. I have a cylinder. From the top, it looks like a circle with radius 1cm. From the side, it looks like a square. Can you find the volume of this cylinder?
