One of the best developments in our school at the moment is the willingness of pupils to lead assemblies and teach each other. This is particularly the case in reflection assemblies but it is

happening everywhere. Indeed, next week we can look forward to a sixth former leading an assembly in front of 1000 pupils about International Women's Day. After the excellent reflections delivered by the Muslim Student Experience, this week we began a cycle of anti-racism reflections which also celebrate the cultures that make up our school community. Students and pupils have been working with Ms Kelly, our anti-racism coordinator, to prepare

these assemblies and they are very much appreciated. This week we learned about China

and the experience of our Chinese pupils. I learned a lot. In their presentation pupils talked about Chinese traditions, Hong Kong and China, and the richness of Chinese culture all throughout the world. Even the school bell played a Chinese pop hit when classes changed.

Mrs Drew (Careers Lead) explains more:

On Tuesday, Chapter 7 students attended a very special talk given by Dr Charlie Whitford and his team from MTC Liverpool. This careers talk was to introduce students to the vast field of engineering and to look at some of the work MTC and engineers around the world are involved in every day. Pupils were gripped by stories of powerful lasers and medical procedures and then were told about Boston Dynamics Spot, the robotic dog, and it's work to investigate the benefits of using advanced robotics to reduce the use of chemicals in the agricultural sector. Pupils were then extremely lucky to have Spot join the presentation! We watched Spot walk, dance and hop and pupils were given the chance to find out all about Spot's work in engineering. Thank you again to Dr Whitford and the team for this very special careers talk.

Then Prof Atkinson, dean of the school of electrical engineering, electronics and computer science of the University of Liverpool gave a sixth form lecture and discussion around Al. It was refreshing to learn that Professor Atkinson had studied humanities subjects at A level but was now an internationally recognized scholar in the field of Al. Our sixth formers asked some excellent questions about the ethics and possibilities of Al, something which will impact their working lives and their lives as citizens.

The Chaplaincy Charity Action Group made more than 100 sandwiches this week for the homeless charity Liverpool in Arms. Pupils and staff donated supplies to make a variety of sandwiches including vegetarian and vegan options. Liverpool in Arms gave out the sandwiches in town later in the evening outside Primark. A big thank you to Liverpool College catering team who were enormously helpful by donating all the sandwich boxes and ensuring we had aprons and food-safe gloves to prepare everything.
