Dear Parents,

In my Chapter 7 RS class, one pupil described the Big Bang to me. He was clearly informed about it. His description reminded me of the momentum, speed, energy, and creativity of the beginning of this school year.

Yes, we are OFF, beginning the 2023-2024 school year with a serious sense of purpose. It is wonderful to see Reception settling in beautifully, initially with parental accompaniment, now as pupils at the school, engaging in the learning opportunities provided by this excellent weather. This ability of teachers to bring pupils right back into the routines and expectations of school, and to use the recommitment to learning is on display everywhere.

This year, in response to parental requests, we have increased the number of meetings for parents on campus. This led to the beginning of year meetings in all chapters. It is impressive to see some parents attend all of these for the several children they have in the school. The meetings are about expectations, routines, changes and especially about how we can work together to make the school better. For me attending these events is a glimpse into the care, dedication, and planning of teachers and staff across the school. My hope is that these meetings will evolve over time and become an ever more effective way of exchanging views and information, and ensuring that teachers, staff and leaders get to know parents and vice versa.

An important message from Mrs Lines for secondary phase parents:

Today the My Child at School App and Student Portal are fully live. You can access your child's timetable, reports and behaviour points from the MCAS app as well as all school communication.

Satchel One is where all homework can be seen.

Our first school assemblies have focused on two things. The first is the introduction of reflection assemblies to replace Chapel and non-Chapel. This is an initiative driven by pupils who rightly, in my view, wanted to find a way to end the Chapel-non chapel division and reflect together. We are looking forward to the development of these assemblies for Chapters 3-13. Another major change has been the new mobile phone policy in the senior school. The effect of no phones in senior school has been immediate. We feel strongly that the maintenance of

this policy (a ban on possessing or using a phone on school campus) is a key part of our strategy to improve behaviour, communal life and relationships, attitude to learning, and quality of engagement. Your support for this policy is much appreciated.




Each week in this newsletter I highlight some of the amazing art our pupils and students produce.

This is the time of year when pupils and students have a chance to sign up and try something new. The Greek Academy, hosted at Liverpool College, is an amazing experience which I can recommend fully:

This project is a unique opportunity for students in Year 9, 10, 11, 12 or 13 and above in and around Liverpool to learn Ancient Greek. The project is funded by the charity <u>Classics for All</u> and run in conjunction with Liverpool University. It is entirely free for students to attend and classes are held at Liverpool College on Saturday mornings during term time. At the end of the first year students have the opportunity to sit an <u>Intermediate Greek Certificate</u> which is equivalent to a half GCSE and as well as being endorsed by a number of leading universities and organisations it is now recognised as a QIP by UCAS which means that universities can recognise the qualification. Students who pass this can then go on to study a full GCSE the following year if they want to.
