Dear Parents,

Happy Hanukkah.

I neglected in last week's newsletter to report on Mr Ridley's GCSE RS Chapter 10 class' visit across the road to St. Anthony of Padua. It is wonderful that we are able for the first time in more than a decade to offer, by popular demand, this additional GCSE in our curriculum. The pupils are very excited about their learning in this subject which includes ethical studies and the studies of different religions and religious preferences. The closing of Queens Drive, which has led to road rage and traffic delays, in this instance provides a very peaceful path to our neighbours the Franciscans. Fr Terence introduced the pupils to the church and answered questions about Franciscan life. More visits are planned to mosque, synagogue and hopefully temple.


Our primary pupils have also been busy supporting local charities as our chaplaincy team describe:





The Mini Vinnies, a group in Prep interested in helping others - the motto is 'see-think-do' - recently began a year-long foodbank collection in Prep to highlight how important foodbanks are in our city. They visited the South Liverpool Foodbank at Bridge Chapel and learned how the foodbank helps individuals and families who struggle with hunger and other issues. The Mini Vinnies brought along food collected from Chapter 4 families. They also presented a Reflection on foodbanks to the Prep School. Thank you to the South Liverpool Foodbank for welcoming us so warmly! Thank you to Prep families for supporting our year-long foodbank collection especially at Christmas time.

One of the absolute highlights of the term so far has been the inclusive project work undertaken by Mr Sani and Ms Odita-Sani. They have researched, edited, and produced around 40 poster sized portraits of famous Liverpudlians, many with an association to our school and our surrounding neighbourhoods, who are people of colour. The walls of our school will begin to mirror the diversity of our school community and give some concrete form to our journey to become more inclusive, multi-faith and anti-racist. The plan is to invite staff and others to select locations for these portraits and to, wherever possible, invite those whose portraits hang in our school, to come speak to our pupils.



This week's **musicians of the week** are Riley A and Oliver F (Ch9) who excel in BPM rehearsals every week; trying new instruments, willing to give up the instrument they're currently playing to let newer members of the orchestra try them out, excellent musicianship and all round excellent example as music scholars to younger pupils. I enjoyed taking it all in and it was surreal to see the famous door and who entered from it. I chatted to the Prime Minister and he thanked me for my service! The London Gospel choir put on a great performance and really lifted the atmosphere. I thoroughly enjoyed my time and I have no doubt it will aid me in my A-levels.
