After the terrible attack on Israel last Saturday, and the now inevitable loss of innocent life and much pain and suffering, we as a school have to reflect on our core values and ensure our children promote always and in every circumstance the path of peace, of friendship, of mutual respect. As always, there is no place for anti-Semitism or Islamophobia in our school. We should never reduce other people to objects of prejudice, hate or violence. Parents must set the example of this fundamental attitude on which the school can build, can educate, and can improve. For this reason, I was so heartened to hear of our and other schools' sixth formers, of all faiths and backgrounds, learning and studying together, and attending a Liverpool Classical Association talk about 'Dream Analysis and Ancient Greek Medicine' at King David High School and offering support and friendship to each other at this difficult time.

Mr Sani has researched an amazing list of people making contributions in every area of political, cultural and academic life.
