Dear Parents,

A double-booked cake fuelled morning. Primary parents have been invited to Ms Pease's coffee morning. In senior school, the Macmillan cake sale organised by the Charity Action Group creates a palpable sense of excitement. I am going to try to sprint between the two.

Our governors work hard to make Liverpool College better and it is a sign of a stable and well governed school when parents do not worry about what the governors are up to. Every policy, and every new initiative is of course taken to and approved by governors who are 16 in number. They are responsible for oversight, strategic direction, compliance. They challenge us frequently to do better, think differently, and systematically improve the education we offer your child.

Few people have done more for governors since 2003 than Mrs Monica Mason who stepped down as chair of the governing body which she has led for 8 years. Mrs Mason is an A level examiner, and formerly a trainer of teachers in higher education. Her own son began at the College in 1990. She has been an enormous help in the period before and after our transition to academy status. Fortunately, her passion and knowledge will not be lost to us as she will continue as vice-chair. The new chair is Professor Tim Nichol who many of you know for his years of service as PTA treasurer. Professor Nichol is the Dean of the Liverpool Business School and has lengthy experience of service in governance of schools and educational settings.

Some parents ask how they can become a governor. There are two elected parent governors. The elections are held every four years. The majority of our governors are appointed by the Liverpool College Foundation.

Mr Heeley writes with passion about a fantastic display of character from his 1st XV Rugby team:
