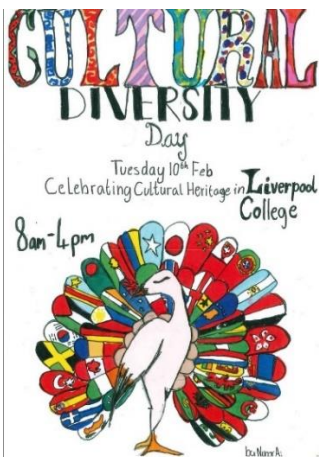
Dear Parents and Carers,

Chapter 7 pupils took part in an exciting personal development art competition, combining creativity with cultural learning. As part of the challenge, pupils explored the traditions and customs associated with Chinese New Year, developing a deeper understanding of the celebrations and their meaning.

Inspired by what they learned, pupils created vibrant paper lanterns, working together within their houses to produce eye-catching displays. The activity encouraged teamwork, creativity, and an appreciation of global cultures, with pupils showing fantastic enthusiasm throughout.



The competition element has added to the excitement — the house responsible for the most visually stunning display will be awarded valuable house points. The winning house will be announced soon, and we look forward to celebrating the incredible effort and artistic talent shown by all involved.

I also enjoyed my visits to the primary phase this week to see the wide variety of events and learning going on: from Chinese New Year celebrations in Reception, to the launch of our 6th Form volunteer readers programme and the annual Pancake Race, all taking place alongside the excellent teaching and learning that happens every day in the classrooms. What an inspiring and exciting place to visit!



Chapter 9 pupils took part in an exciting Future Food Challenge trip this week organised by Farm Urban, an initiative dedicated to growing food sustainably for both people and the planet while encouraging environmentally responsible behaviour across the city. Mrs Watson reports:

Throughout the day, pupils participated in a range of inspirational workshops where they explored innovative approaches to sustainable food production. They also had the opportunity to meet expert guest speakers working at the forefront of environmental sustainability, gaining valuable insight into the future of food and the importance of greener living. One of the highlights of the trip was the chance for pupils to build their own hydroponics systems, learning how crops can be grown efficiently using water-based techniques.



Our pupils were a true credit to the school. Their behaviour was impeccable, and they impressed

staff and visitors alike with the thoughtful questions they asked and the enthusiasm they showed throughout the experience.

The learning doesn't stop there — pupils are now bringing their ideas back into school and will be working together to create a hydroponic growing system of their own. We look forward to seeing how their creativity and commitment to sustainability continue to grow.

This week was also National Apprenticeship Week. There are 700 different types of apprenticeships across 18 different career sectors and Mrs Drew (Careers Leader) made sure that all secondary pupils learned more about the options available to them through apprenticeships during LC+ sessions this week. Chapter 7 also had an additional talk to help improve their knowledge and understanding of what apprenticeships are.
