We welcomed the Anthony Walker Foundation back to school this week to run a series of training workshops with our Chapter 8 pupils and also an assembly for Chapter 7. Our AntiRacism pupil ambassadors supported every session and were a real credit to their learning over the past year around tackling racism. Mrs Kelly shares more details:

This week, the Anthony Walker Foundation made a significant impact across the school. Chapter 8 pupils welcomed the opportunity to share and discuss their experiences of racism, microaggressions, bias, and racial slurs. They participated in group activities led by our Chapter 8 Ambassadors: Khaled B, Anas T, Nnamdi I, Leonardo L, Sofia S, and Vian M.



Pupils also embraced the concept of what it means to be an active bystander and how to challenge racist behaviour. It was inspirational to hear the emotional and mature responses from many pupils and to see how this learning opportunity provoked thoughtful and meaningful discussions.

Chapter 7 pupils also had the opportunity to begin their journey of racism awareness by learning about Anthony Walker and exploring how to recognise, reject, and respond to racist behaviour.

This week, as part of our whole-school approach to promoting positive mental health and wellbeing, we were thrilled to welcome the LFC Foundation into school. Their team delivered two inspiring assemblies to our Chapter 8 and Chapter 9 pupils, introducing an exciting project that will be taking place here over the coming weeks: the On Target Programme.



The On Target programme is a six-week initiative designed to help young people understand and improve their thoughts, feelings, and behaviours. It aims to equip pupils with practical tools to support their mental health something that matters more than ever. Throughout the programme, groups of students will take part in engaging, interactive sessions that focus on: Building communication skills and positive relationships, Developing self-esteem and confidence, Challenging unhelpful or negative thinking, Strengthening resilience, Understanding the impact of social media and promoting healthy body image, Learning coping strategies and self-care techniques.

Thank you to Mrs Scott (College Mental Health Coordinator) for all her hard work in accessing and facilitating these and other opportunities and resources that help support and promote our pupils' mental health and wellbeing.
